School Description

Located amongst the mountaintops of the Santa Clarita Valley, Mountainview Elementary School, home to approximately 880 students and a staff of about 100 adults, embraces high academic and behavior expectations which are taught, encouraged, and recognized alongside a civic learning focus. We encourage our students to achieve their personal best as revealed in our school's Peer Academic and Social Empowerment (PASE) program. Focusing on both academic and social areas for success, our program incorporates such powerful components as peer tutoring, buddy classes, a student run valet, student service, sixth grade leadership, peer mentoring, and a "Circle of Friends" inclusion program throughout a student's day. Within each of these subprograms, students and teachers provide service to other peers and classrooms in addition to supporting and facilitating the community spirit Mountainview hopes to exemplify. In the classroom, teachers provide whole group lessons, small group English Language Development lessons, small group intervention for those in need, as well as extension opportunities for those working at and above grade level. This differentiation meets students at their current instructional level and continues to set high expectations for students to reach or exceed the standard. Parents are encouraged and welcomed as classroom volunteers, presenters at our school-wide Career Day, field trip chaperones, Junior Achievement instructors, School Site Council representatives and active members of our PTA. A strong bond is nurtured between student, staff and parent community evidenced by the relationships observed in the classroom, out of the classroom and within the community at large. Integrating these together encourages all students to engage actively in the school, build positive relationships, and apply this learning to social responsibility within our school and community.

Mountainview parents and community members serve as Site Council leaders, active PTA members, and volunteers in and out of the classroom. Our School Site Council monitors all school programs, student safety, and the school budget. Parent input is received via annual surveys and through feedback after specific events. PTA partners with us to enhance the curriculum through providing specialized instructors in our music and arts programs, and off campus curricular opportunities. PTA also helps our Student Service Leaders coordinate community service. Parent workshops are provided to help parents learn how to best support their children and to build strong home to school communication.

School Safety Plan

Mountainview Elementary School provides a safe, clean environment for learning through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Mountainview's Parent/Student Handbook outlines district and school policies and procedures concerning emergency situations, playground behavior, and special services. Fire Drills are conducted monthly. Disaster preparedness drills are conducted quarterly and include earthquake and lock down.

Mountainview Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, the entrance is secured to ensure visitors check in with the front office. All visitors are required to sign in and wear a visitor's badge during their stay, and check out at the front office upon departure.

A comprehensive School Safety Plan developed under SB18 guidelines addresses each of the following four goals:

- All students and staff members are provided a safe teaching and learning environment.
- All students are safe and secure while at school and when traveling to and from school.
- District programs and approved community resources are made available to students and parents.
- Schools provide the educational environment where students, parents, staff, and community members shall effectively communicate in a manner that is respectful to all cultural, racial, and religious backgrounds.

Professional Development provided for Teachers

Since 1988, California has sought to provide intensive learning experiences for beginning teachers. To provide an effective transition into the teaching career for first-year and second-year teachers, several programs have been developed statewide and are in use in our district. The Beginning Teacher Induction Program extends individual training and support in the practice of teaching. Additionally, we have a Peer Assistance and Review (PAR) program to extend assistance and support to credentialed teachers newly hired who may need support transitioning into our school district.

Professional growth activities are planned annually based on current needs and input received from staff. This year the teachers' work calendar includes two professional development days that focus implementing our newly adopted English Language Arts curriculum and Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). Additional opportunities have also been provided regarding technology integration with our interactive flat panels (IFP), Special Education needs, Teachers on Special Assignment (TOSA) workshops, and planning time within grade level teams to implement the State Standards. Staff development during Tuesday staff meetings primarily focuses on continued implementation of effective instructional strategies, and continued lesson development to help students master state standards in English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics. We continue to implement 30 minutes of designated ELD instruction daily as well as integrated support for ELD students during other content instruction, provide Intervention for struggling students in core content areas, and to target listening and speaking standards. Collaborative Planning time continues to be made available by early release days on designated Wednesdays and 3 full days of planning throughout the school year allowing teachers the time to plan together within and across grade levels focused on increasing student achievement.
